



Teacher Leadership Program

In March of 2014, Linn-Mar was one of 39 school districts awarded the Teacher Leadership grant by the Iowa Department of Education. The Teacher Leadership and Compensation (TLC) system provides opportunities for a minimum of 25% of teaching staff to participate in leadership roles.

Teacher Leadership is an opportunity for teachers to help their colleagues by sharing instructional resources, areas of expertise, and effective teaching strategies in a variety of roles in and out of the classroom setting. All of our Teacher Leaders work with adult learners, communicate with the staff and the community as well as have an impeccable knowledge of content and pedagogy.

Teacher Leadership at Linn-Mar is a cooperative effort to improve instructional practice and enhance student learning and achievement.

At Linn-Mar, there are 23 full time Teacher Leaders and 128 classroom teachers who participate in a variety of leadership roles in • Upgraded core network curriculum, PBIS, technology, MTSS, and model teaching.

1:1 Initiative

The school board approved a four-year rollout for every student at Linn-Mar to receive a device at school. The initiative, to be carried out in phases, first provides for computers for all high school students followed by devices for all students in grades K-8 in the coming years. This will allow teachers and students to access digital content for courses. The high school also expanded the amount of blended learning course offerings where students have a mix of face-to-face and online coursework.

LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS

Renovation Projects 2018-2019

Bowman Woods Elementary:

Phase II of a remodeling project included updating restrooms, interior door replacement, and classroom Pod removal. Bowman Woods also had security access controls installed on exterior doors.

Indian Creek Elementary:

Remodeling at Indian Creek saw the second phase of a restroom remodel as well as locker replacement, new lighting, and sewer and floor replacement. Security access controls were also installed on exterior doors.

Wilkins Elementary:

In addition to remodeled restrooms and new lockers, the Wilkins roof was replaced. New windows and ceiling tile were installed.

Excelsior Middle School:

Security access controls were installed on exterior doors.

Oak Ridge Middle School:

Security access controls were installed on exterior doors.

Linn-Mar High School:

New fire doors and a chiller for the HVAC system were installed at the High School. The roof and a rooftop HVAC unit were replaced.

5th/6th Grade Intermediate **Schools:**

Construction on Linn-Mar's two new 5th/6th grade buildings began. Boulder Peak and Hazel Point are on track to open for the 2020-2021 school year.
