Dear Wilkins Families,

We are settling into a great routine after the winter break and students are hard at work in the classrooms. We are very excited to announce that Wilkins Elementary has been asked to pilot a new literacy intervention for the district called Lexia Reading Core5. This is a web-based intervention that can take place on any electronic device, including iPads. I will be speaking more about this at the PTO meeting on

Monday, February 5th.

As a school, we will be working during the month of February to implement this research-based intervention into the school day. Students will begin by taking an auto-placement skills assessment that will determine where their intervention needs to begin. Once they are placed at the appropriate level, students will spend anywhere from 20 to 80 minutes each week working with Lexia. The program is very "game-like" so the students will be highly engaged while they are learning. As the month continues, start asking your child about this intervention, I have no doubt they will have positive things to report!

I also wanted to notify you that we will be continuing our ALICE lessons with students with a focus on barricading classrooms in case of an intruder. These lessons will take place towards the end of February and students will be learning what types of barricades work best if an intruder would ever enter our building. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions over these lessons.

Finally, I just wanted to remind you all that there are several NO SCHOOL days in February. Teachers will be working diligently on report cards on Friday, February 16th and there is also a teacher PD day on Monday, February 19th. Report cards will be sent home on February 23rd so please look for them at that point. Also, we are looking forward to the next round of parent/teacher conferences on March 1st & 6th - we always appreciate the opportunity to discuss student progress with parents!

Grade Level News Valentine's

<u>KINDERGARTEN:</u> January was a big improvement for Kindergarten! Students came back from Winter Break ready to learn and put their skills into use! They have been working hard to fill their Sight Words gumball machines. We are now onto the blue words of our Rainbow words, so keep practicing them at home! Students have enjoyed more independence with their reading and writing as well. Some are able to write sentences and use nouns, verbs, and adjectives in their writing. Students are working on consistently using capital letters at the beginning of sentences, finger spaces between words and putting a punctuation mark at the end. Journeys, our reading curriculum, has focused on several science concepts as the theme for each week. Students learned about changes in weather during the different seasons. We examined how weather changes affect animals and how animals use their different body parts. Kindergarteners have learned about different types of animal homes and what is in the night sky. During math, we continue to work on counting by 1s, 2s, 5s, and 10s. We are writing and solving addition and subtraction problems as well. These young kiddos are super excited about their learning and show their teachers everyday how much they love school!

FIRST GRADE: Our Journey's stories during February include Little Rabbit's Tale, Frog and Toad, Amazing Animals, and Whistle for Willie. Students also receive literature that supports these themes during guided practice. Students will be exploring long vowel sounds and vowel patterns.

Our sixth math unit teaches students fact power, and also introduces quarters and centimeters. Addition, subtraction, and counting money can be hard concepts for first graders. Support and celebrate your child's progress at home.

When preparing items any food items for our Friendship Party please check with your classroom teacher about any food allergies. Our classroom parties will be Tuesday, February 14 at 2:00.

Science has first graders finishing their Sound and Light FOSS units. Students love this engaging curriculum that is the basis for further learning in years to come. This month students will learn properties of light and concepts such as it bounces, bends, and moves in a straight line.

<u>SECOND GRADE:</u> January was a BUSY month for 2nd grade! February we will be picking up the pace more with math. We are beginning to go over more multiplication, division, fractions, and measuring. We will discuss equivalent fractions, compare fractions, and use number stories with fractions. We are in the middle of our solids and liquids science unit. Once it wraps up, we will move on to the last unit: Plants and Insects. FAST assessments are taking place right now, as well as NWEA. Conferences are right around the corner, so be on the lookout for sign up and report cards coming home. Please continue to support your child's learning at home! Thank you for everything you do as parents!

THIRD GRADE: The third graders are excited about completing their cursive instruction! We have been doing a lot of practicing and have earned our "cursive license." Each student has the freedom to write in cursive whenever they choose. In science, they have been learning about patterns in motion! Students are enjoying the investigations that have taught them about gravity, balance, and motion. Soon we will be experimenting with ramps and wheels. The students have been learning about geometry in math. They've learned line segments, lines, rays, and how to label the parts of a 3-D shape. We revisited informative writing in January, using the social studies topic of communities. Each student wrote what they learned about for each community including important facts and details. Students completed the entire writing process which consists of planning, writing a rough draft, editing, and a completing a final draft. They take a lot of pride in this process! Thank you to all of the parents for promoting reading at home! Continue to fill out the monthly reading minute sheets please! We are so proud of our 3rd graders and look forward to yet another engaging month of learning! Stay tuned.

<u>FOURTH GRADE</u>: Fourth grade students have been working hard since returning from Winter Break. We recently finished Benchmark testing that goes along with our Journeys series. We have been learning how to divide in math will begin working on fractions after taking the Mid-Year test. We are wrapping up our Energy unit in Science. In Social Studies we will start learning about the Midwest Region. During this unit we will learn about resources in the region, geography and famous people that have made an impact on this region. Please continue to have students read 20 minutes each night. As hard as it is to believe, conferences are right around the corner! We look forward to visiting with you about the progress your student has made in 4th grade!

FIFTH GRADE: In math, we are completing unit 7, which involves order of operations and adding and subtracting positive and negative numbers. In unit 8, fifth graders will be comparing, adding, subtracting, and dividing fractions and mixed numbers.

Skills and strategies taught in reading this month include: story structure: plot, characters, conflict, events, and resolution. In addition, we will further explore theme, characterization, and figurative language. In writing, students will finish narrative essays. Upon completion of narrative writing, our focus will return to opinion writing.

In social studies, we will finish our study of European explorers and their expeditions. Next students will learn about the first colonies which include: Roanoke, Jamestown, and Plymouth. Students will discover why Europeans started settlements in the New World and the impact those settlements had on Native Americans.

In science, we will finish the kit Mixtures and Solutions. Towards the end of this month, we will begin our last kit called Living Systems. In Living Systems, students will investigate human, animal, and plant systems.

EARLY CHILDHOOD PROGRAMS

The Linn-Mar Community School District offers programs for four and five year old children. The number of sections, the location sites, and daily schedules for these programs will be determined by the district after schools have collected the data needed for making these decisions.

Preschool for Four Year Olds

- Age 4 on or by September 15, 2018
- No cost due to Linn-Mar being a part of the Statewide Voluntary Preschool Program
- Half day, Four days a week

Online registration will be held Tuesday, February 20th, 2018 at noon. Registration and preschool information can be located at http://tinyurl.com/EarlyChildhoodLM . Computers will be available at the LRC building at 2999 North 10th Street in Marion for those needing assistance for registering their three or four year old children.

Priority enrollment will be given to families that live in the Linn-Mar School District and 20% of the enrollment for the four year old placements will be reserved for families that qualify as low-income.

Children age 5 on or by September 15, 2018, may be served in one of two program models:

<u>Kindergarten</u>	Early Childhood Blended Program
Kindergarten Information Night is January 30 th . The meeting at Wilkins will begin at 6:30 pm.	lf you are unsure if your child is ready for kindergarten, Linn- Mar's ECBP may be an option. This program is an all-day program for children that qualify through a screening process.

Parents/Guardians of 5th Grade Students:

Each year, the Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT) is given to all 5th graders in the district. The CogAT is a standardized test, but is quite different from NWEA and Iowa Assessments. The skills measured by the test show the cognitive processes that a child has developed to learn new things and solve problems. Experiences in and out of school affect this skill development.

The CogAT consists of three separate tests: Verbal, Non-Verbal, and Quantitative. The test battery will be administered over three days during the week of February 20-23 for 45-50 minutes each day. The results of this test, in combination with NWEA and Iowa Assessment scores, are used in the identification process for the Middle School Talented and Gifted (TAG) program.

Please make sure your child is at school on time each day. It is important that students are wellrested and eat a healthy breakfast to help them do their best. Mother Bruce by Ryan T. Higgins

This book is ADORABLE and witty. Bruce the grumpy bear who likes to steal eggs and create new recipes finds himself in an uncomfortable situation when some of the eggs accidentally hatch! Older kids (a couple of 4th graders read and loved it the other day) and young kids

alike will enjoy reading this book. It's a great opportunity to talk about a play on words and fun to predict what is going to happen from the beginning of the book to the ending.
